Harvest Thanksgiving

I caught myself moaning the other day. I was shopping in Tesco at Bidston. If you've been there you will know that it is a huge superstore with shelves bulging with food of every conceivable type from all around the world; there are 5 aisles just for fresh fruit and veg. And it's not just food they sell but toys, clothes, household appliances, gadgets, stationery and much, much more. This isn't an advert for Tesco by the way but I do want to emphasise it in order to highlight my moan. Surrounded by all of this I moaned because they had no small tins of evaporated milk, a treat for me now and again.

One of the things I find in our society today is that as we are given more and more choice we become less and less grateful and when we find ourselves moaning because we can't get just what we want we need to stop, think and consider:

'If you have food in your fridge, clothes on your back, a roof over your head, and a place to sleep, you are richer than 75% of the world. If you have money in the bank, your wallet, and some spare change, you are among the top 8% of the world's wealthy. If you woke up this morning with more health than illness, you are more blessed than the million people who will not survive this week. If you have never experienced the danger of battle, the agony of imprisonment or

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torture, or the horrible pangs of starvation, you are luckier than 500 million people alive and suffering. If you can read this message you are more fortunate than 3 billion people in the world who cannot read it at all. We would all be more happy and have plenty to be grateful for...if only we would count our blessings rather than our problems.'

As we move into autumn we move into a season of thanksgiving. As a church, we celebrate harvest, thanking God for His providence, (including small tins of evap) and remembering those who have little reason to celebrate.

Christian Aid are asking not just to be grateful for the abundance we experience but to think more ethically about where we buy our food and those who produce it.

The food we buy in the supermarket is grown all over the world so, as we go shopping over the harvest period, get a map of the world and the look through the food labels to see where the food was produced. Find that country on the map and pray for the farmers from those places who have grown your food. Pray for their working conditions and the health of their land. We can also pray into the compromises many of us have to make as we seek to source our food ethically within a fallen world.

Peter Dickson Barr

9th February 1938 – 30th August 2019



Peter was born in Oldham. He lived in Scotland during World War 2. After moving to Wallasey, he attended St George's primary school where his strong Scottish accent prevented him being understood. His secondary education was at Wallasey Grammar School. When he left school, he started work in a Liverpool insurance office.

He was a choirboy at St Hilary's and became a Scout at our church, Wallasey

Presbyterian Church of England at that time. Peter was called up for National Service. After training, he served in the Royal Tank Regiment for 18 months in Germany. He learnt to drive a tank before he learnt to drive a car. Some say he drove a car the same way he drove a tank!

After returning to insurance, he set up his own firm before retiring through ill health.

Peter met Ann at our church. When she went to Leeds University, Ann said "He got used to the East Lancs Road for 3 years". They got engaged, married and raised 2 daughters, Debbie and Jennie, who both married and bore Peter and Ann's grandchildren Issy, Marcus and Abigail.

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ways. He was ordained and inducted as an Elder in Wallasey Village United Reformed Church on 29th September 1974. His rich bass voice was heard in our choir, where latterly he was the only bass singer, and on our stage. More recently he and others sang with the worship band set up by our minister. He also joined other Wallasey church choirs when our choir was invited to join them for major choral works and carol services.

In his early days he was a strong supporter of Liverpool football club. His athletic activity amongst the church community was mainly "Wellie Throwing", both over Bank Holiday weekends in Anglesey and at church retreats, when he was Champion Thrower on several occasions.

He performed in many Brolly Players productions. Our church drama group, an off-shoot of the Umbrella Society, was very active in the 1970s and 1980s when performances included 1-Act to 3-Act plays, at least one of the latter being produced by Peter, and home-produced pantomimes in which Peter starred and relished the "baddie" roles. A highlight of one of the later variety shows was the Gilbert & Sullivan "Gendarmes Duet" performed by Peter and his father-in-law Charles Hamilton which brought the house down!

In recent years, he was a volunteer at "Little Stars", our mother and baby group. Where he mostly did washing up

Peter enjoyed cooking and produced many tasty dishes for consumption at home, at church including church barbecues, and elsewhere on holidays around the world. He was famous for his mushroom soups and did his share of washing up.

His main hobby was photography. A vast number of his photographs recorded the many dishes, both his own and more by others, which he and fellow diners were about to enjoy together.

Peter was always looking out for the latest gadgets. A Swiss army knife with several blades, a screwdriver, corkscrew and a "thing for getting stones out of horses' hooves" was only part of his large collection of curious implements and useful gimmicks with which he entertained and astonished his friends.

He was a family man who enjoyed telling stories and jokes. He had a repertoire of funny noises and faces to entertain the children. Like many people with much humour in their lives, Peter had his good days and his bad days. His friends and family could rarely tell whether he was being serious or pulling their legs.

Shortly after a period which Debbie had spent with him, Peter died peacefully at home with Ann and Jennie at his bedside. The photograph on the front cover of the "Service of Celebration and Thanksgiving" for his life delightfully captures the twinkle in his eyes for which we will remember him.

Farewell, Peter. We will miss you and will long remember your loud "AMEN"s.

Support Fairtrade



With global cocoa prices stuck at unsustainably low levels, Fairtrade is moving a step closer towards securing a decent income for impoverished cocoa farmers - many of whom earn less than US\$1 dollar a day.

"Most cocoa farmers are unable to afford decent housing, food and education, and that will continue as long as chocolate traders, manufacturers and brands fail to address the issue of price," said Fairtrade International CEO Darío Soto Abril. "Many farmers still live in extreme poverty."

As part of the solution to the huge power imbalances in cocoa supply chains, the Fairtrade Minimum Price - which acts as a safety net for farmers - will increase by 20 percent for conventional cocoa from October 1st, and even more for organic. At the same time, the Fairtrade Premium will also rise by 20 percent. Growers decide for themselves how to spend the Premium - for example by building community facilities or investing in their farms to improve productivity or diversify crops.

"Fairtrade's new Minimum Price and Premium for cocoa will help lift many growers out of extreme poverty and move towards a decent income," said Soto Abril. "However, there's still a long way to go before farmers earn enough to enjoy a decent standard of living."

Alongside an increase in the Fairtrade Minimum Price and Premium at the beginning of October, revised



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living income reference prices have been set for Ghana and Côte d'Ivoire which show the price farmers need to receive for their cocoa in order to enjoy the basics such as decent housing, nutritious food and education.

The Fairtrade Living Income Reference Price is based on what farmers need to earn for a decent standard of living, taking into account variables such as viable farm size, sustainable yields, production costs and potential savings from growing food for home consumption on the farm. After a revision of the preliminary reference values, they have now been updated to US\$2.20 per kilo of cocoa at the farm gate for Côte d'Ivoire and US\$2.10 for Ghana.

"Several brands have already committed to this vision. Tony's Chocolonely, a leading chocolate brand with a track record of paying additional funding to farmers, has committed to paying the revised Living Income Reference Price from October. Oxfam Fair Trade and Belvas have already been committed to the Fairtrade Living Income Price for several months. "It's a great start, but we want to work with many more chocolate companies to help farmers achieve a decent income," said Soto Abril.

Together with the new Minimum Price and Premium, the Fairtrade Living Income Reference Price comes into effect a full year ahead of a planned 'living income differential' announced by the governments of Ghana and Côte d'Ivoire. Fairtrade has welcomed the government initiative as an important step towards securing sustainable prices for cocoa farmers.
