Lockdown misery and Easter Hope

This will be our second Easter in lockdown.

Whilst a few might be able to get to church for our 'one off' Easter Day service, most will experience worship as we have for the last year, in our homes.

For many, the experience of the last 12 months have been rather like an extended Good Friday. People have suffered much physically, emotionally and spiritually because of the effects of Civid-19 and the future seems uncertain. But those who put their trust in Jesus are Easter People – we know that life brings its sufferings – and boy has this pandemic done that – and we know that we will all experience death – and boy has this pandemic made that all the more difficult to bear. But we are an Easter People and our hope lies in a Saviour who experienced suffering and death but endured; and therein lies our hope and our future.

As the vaccine roll out expands and gathers effectiveness, there is hope of life returning to 'normal', and plans are underway to prepare for opening church so that we can be together, fellowshipping in person.

Pastor S. M. Lockbridge summed our hope up in this way:

Let us also pray that we, ourselves do not obstruct the way. Amen *Ed.*




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Easter Thoughts

Wallasey Village URC -Finance report 2020

Where we are now

First of all, can I thank our fellowship for maintaining their giving and responding to our requests for funding during 2020. You will see from the figures that we have met our Free Will offering target and reduced our expenditure. A couple of comments to note - 1) for the first couple of months we were fully functioning with full energy costs and bookings payments, and 2) for most of the year we have benefited from little or no energy costs. The Village Rooms bank account is maintaining its monthly transfer in support of our costs. Thank you also to those who are now giving via their bank accounts. This has largely solved the management of our offerings, and standing orders are particularly helpful.

Our giving

We have not been able to support charities in the usual ways in 2020 for various reasons. Individuals maintained support of charities and David set up the Christian Aid collection in May which raised £1,043.49 plus £630.00 in Gift Aid. Before Christmas the front room was set up safely to receive donations from members and visitors for Foodbank and the Charles Thompson Mission. Support of Operation Christmas Child was maintained (thank you Heather for the 90 boxes!) and we shared with Prenton the £220 postage costs.



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Our spending

For the past few years up to 2020, we have had fairly healthy bank accounts and fund reserves, including grants and donations. This enabled us to continue with our Phase 2c project. Despite lockdown we were able to finish work on the rear entrance and cellar, and builders have now started work on a new kitchen and the improvement of toilet facilities. We will be using grants which we already have, or which are committed, together with the very welcome donations from members and friends towards the work.

Because of Pentecost you can look in and not be afraid.


If the Christ who died had stopped at the cross, His work had been incomplete.

Please share the link and poster via email or on social media – encourage any young people you know to listen either alone, with family or with a group of friends.








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Christian Aid Week

Christian Aid Week began in 1957, with the aim to encourage public awareness, this led to the Charity adopting the name Christian Aid in 1964. Its aim in the 1960s was to make people aware of the threat of hunger and the possibility of famine.

This year Christian Aid Week will focus on the plight of drought which numerous countries around the world face. It recognises that droughts have become more intense and more common because of the changing climate. The impact on the world population is great, as it means that millions of people around the world struggle to get the food and water that they need.

Because of the continuing Coronavirus pandemic Christian Aid Week this year will be a virtual affair. Christian Aid is asking volunteers to host virtual fundraising events such as online bingo, or an online quiz that they are calling Quiztian Aid.

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From the editors

Early Christian wanted to get away from celebrating New Years Day on 1st January because of its association with paganism. So they started celebrating it on the feast of the Conception—25th March. It was celebrated for many years on this day, but ordinary folk often persisted in celebrating it on 1st January. When Pope Gregory reformed the calendar in 1588, he moved New Year's Day to January 1st. Protestant countries were slow to follow this reformation. Scotland did so on 1st January 1600 but England and Wales reformed in September 1752, (so for 152 years the date in Scotland was different from the date in England and Wales) bringing England and Wales back into line with Scotland. In order to keep taxes and rents in line (ie to avoid paying a years tax on a year only 353 days long) the day when tax was due was moved from 25th March to 6th April, where it remains to this day.



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
